



state of Israel so far. We call on Israel to halt its relentless assault on the Palestinian people, the US government to hold Israel accountable for ethnic cleansing, and finally on the American people to hold our government responsible for its continued and unquestioning military and diplomatic support of Israel.

Update: On Friday morning, as a result of increased international pressure, Israel conceded to a cease fire. However important, a ceasefire does not fix the underlying apartheid. We remain vigilant and in solidarity with the Palestinian people.

In Colombia, labor union leaders, student organization leaders, members of Indigenous communities, the teachers union, women's groups and others have been on strike and in the streets since Labor Day. These leaders are putting their lives on the line for increased social and economic justice in light of the devastation of the COVID pandemic. Over 42 People have lost their life in these protests. There have been allegations of rape and other police abuse. Colombia has a history of severe human rights abuses and is funded heavily in security and military aid by the United States. We demand that the US stop its military aid to Colombia; aid which is being used against Colombian people exercising their right to protest.

In Solidarity with struggles and resistance movements in the United States, Turtle Island, and all over the world. Another world is possible and needed there is no going back. We stand also with the Anishinaabe people, as well as people in Mozambique, Ethiopia, Myanmar and so many other where the struggle continues against an extractive system to one for self-determination, fair community land rights, and justice.
