

Tishman Environment and Design Center (Renewed Mission)

The Tishman Environment and Design Center (TEDC) fosters the integration of bold design, policy, and social justice approaches to environmental issues to advance just and sustainable outcomes in the context of diverse community participation. The Center connects interdisciplinary faculty research and practice with innovative pedagogy to address critical issues generated by the impacts of climate change and other environmental threats to community well being. Applying design strategies, social science perspectives, and the tools of ecological analysis and intervention, TEDC initiatives confront the most pressing issues of the day while engaging students to envision a more social-ecologically resilient and just world.

To assure that The New School is an exemplar of urban green design, construction, sustainable institutional practices and behaviors, TEDC works with faculty, staff, students, and key administrators. Initiatives seek to exemplify the level of campus sustainability achieved with the LEED Gold University Center. The TEDC studio/workshop space serves as a dedicated hub for faculty, students, staff, and community members to plan, convene, create, assess, and showcase initiatives across disciplines and the university.



TISHMAN ENVIRONMENT AND DESIGN CENTER THE NEW SCHOOL

The Tishman Environment and Design Center (TEDC) fosters the integration of design strategies and bold social and ecological approaches to environmental issues to advance just and sustainable outcomes within a community context.

From its inception, the Tishman Environment and Design Center (TEDC) has exercised a vital university-wide role at The New School. Under the aegis of TEDC, an interdisciplinary undergraduate Environmental Studies degree program was launched and has provided students from three divisions a wide array of academic experiences and supported internships. TEDC public programming has offered dozens of major events featuring prominent speakers, environmentally-relevant arts exhibitions, public forums, and workshops; faculty research has connected scholars to work on such topics as urban resilience, food systems, land-use and restoration through New York City-wide and international networks, with attention to the relationships between environmental issues and design strategies across all these initiatives. Many initiatives have provided particular attention to issues of environmental justice.

Building on this work, TEDC is now prepared to take bold steps to address the increasingly urgent need to integrate design and environment to confront climate change and its impacts on social justice; to foster efforts that enhance urban resilience; and to provide New School faculty, students,

and staff opportunities for research, teaching, practice, and environmental citizenship at a new level of intensity and on a wider range of issues.

This document presents a vision for a relaunched TEDC and a three-year plan to achieve the vision through teaching, research, and community by:

- Unveiling ReNew School:Project

 14K, the Center's premiere multiyear project. Through Project 14K, TEDC will galvanize the 14,000 faculty, students and staff in the TNS community to become fully aware, service-oriented climate citizens of the campus and greater NYC community;
- Developing academic coursework to address critical issues generated by the impacts of climate change and other environmental threats to community well-being and social justice; and
- Maintaining a specific focus on deep engagement with underserved urban communities to foster climate justice.

Description of Key Roles

TEDC Director

The Director of the Tishman Environment and Design Center will oversee strategic, operational, and budgetary aspects of TEDC, and will continue to lead the revitalization of TEDC to achieve the goals set forth in this planning document. The Director will implement the TEDC vision, exercising oversight of specific programs and directions, will supervise staff, and will work with the TEDC Advisory Committee (discussed below) to assure the participation of all stakeholders. In addition, the Director will provide leadership, guidelines, and contacts to fundraising and communication efforts. The Director will keep senior New School leadership and the Tishman family apprised of the progress of TEDC.

TEDC Associate Directors

Associate Directors will support the TEDC Director in all areas. There will be two Associate Directors. Each Associate Director will provide input to the Director on strategy, develop ReNew School: Project 14K, and facilitate communication about TEDC directions among the various stakeholders.

Associate Directors will be especially important for keeping TEDC visible among faculty and students at NSPE, Parsons, Lang and NSSR and seeking out prospective projects among them. The Associate Directors will also monitor the progress of ongoing TEDC initiatives and research (including research assistants), keep the TEDC Director apprised of issues and opportunities, and identify resources TEDC may provide to enhance the impact of a given project. Associate Directors will also be responsible for developing and maintaining relationships with communities, the business sector and other research institutions who we may collaborate with.

In short, the Associate Directors will provide the "connective tissue" for TEDC and its stakeholders so necessary for the success of the Center and critical to New School sustainability and its impact through teaching, research, and community and constituent engagement.

TEDC Affiliated Faculty

As an interdisciplinary program, TEDC brings together faculty from across the campus. These scholars teach, conduct research and/or service in areas related to the environment and at the intersections of design, policy and social justice. A TEDC affiliated faculty member holds an academic appointment in departments or interdisciplinary programs throughout The New School that support and advocate the mission of TEDC. Furthermore, TEDC Affiliated Faculty are instrumental in assisting the center with curriculum development and in the execution of the ReNew School: Project 14K initiative designed to strengthen the university's commitment to sustainability on and beyond the campus community. Affiliated Faculty can include full-time faculty (tenure and non tenure track) as well as half and three quarter time instructors, including but not limited to, Adjuncts.

Affiliated Faculty members serve as advocates for and liaisons to TEDC by keeping the Center informed of potential coursework and co-curricular collaborations within their respective departments and programs. Affiliated Faculty also participate, attend and promote events and programs administered by TEDC throughout the year as well as engage in networking and collaborative opportunities with faculty, staff and students across campus. In addition to having their accomplishments featured in the TEDC e-newsletter and being listed on the TEDC website as a joint member, TEDC Affiliated Faculty are eligible for select research funding support by way of their affiliation.

TEDC Advisory Committee

This consultative body will advise the TEDC Leadership on such matters as internal and external relations, fundraising opportunities, and relevant developments and opportunities in the fields in which the Committee members are active. The Advisory Committee will meet a minimum of twice annually to advise on priorities for research funding, center based projects and initiatives, and affiliated faculty recommendations.

The eight person committee will include:

- three faculty members, selected through discussions with relevant deans and faculty:
- one staff membership will rotate periodically, selected from such critical areas for campus sustainability as Facilities, Human Resources, and Academic Technology:
- two student members, one undergraduate & one graduate, nominated by the Sustainable Cities Club; and
- two members from the larger (external) community.

The Sustainability Associate will play a central role in defining, implementing, and monitoring campus sustainability initiatives through the Tishman Environment and Design Center (TEDC). Chief responsibilities include monitoring campus greening initiatives, directing members of the New School community to resources that can help achieve greater sustainability, and coordinating efforts by TEDC in its interface to University offices in their efforts to achieve greater standards of sustainability. The Associate will especially focus on assisting those staff charged by their units with enhancing their sustainability initiatives. The Associate will keep the Director and Associate Directors apprised of opportunities and issues relevant to campus sustainability.

The Associate will develop, coordinate, and administer efforts and advise policies within the area of campus sustainability at The New School.


John Clinton: Children's environmental literacy project - already have connections with them

TEDC Database

TEDC will develop a database especially suited to create and supplement collaboration on interdisciplinary climate and climate justice initiatives. Drawing upon existing relevant databases and repositories of information such as the Parsons "data mine" database supported by the University's Green Fund and the "C6" website inventory, the TEDC database will gather this information into one resource accessible by student and Faculty. Information for the database will also be obtained through active outreach to faculty and students, which was already started in Fall 2014. This database will be a critical tool for connecting compatible projects and fostering collaboration among Faculty and students from different schools and disciplines.
